VOCATIONS DAY 2018: IS 'CALLING' PART OF YOUR PARISH CONVERSATIONS?

The Bishop of St Germans has asked all clergy within the diocese to support the forthcoming Vocations Day in Truro Cathedral.

Bishop Chris has asked them to support the day in three ways:

* By telling parishioners about the day and encouraging people to consider whether God is calling them to do something specific in response to His love for them;

* By showing the Living Faith videos (see More Information) within their church communities, whether virtually or in 'real life'; and

* By engaging in personal conversations with individuals about their vocations and how they might consider developing them.

The event will be held in Truro Cathedral on Saturday, March 17, from 10am to 3pm.



'Not just ordained ministry'

The programme will include talks from various people including Bishop Chris, as well as featuring workshops and information sessions, worship and informal group discussions.

The day will not focus solely on talking about vocations to ordained ministry. It will also include information about other types of vocation such as becoming a Reader or Local Worship Leader, a youth leader, a teacher or governor, and other possibilities.

People are invited to come for the whole programme or just for part of it. There will be various stalls about different kinds of vocations all day, and people will be available for conversations with visitors. All are welcome.

GREEN CHURCH KERNOW AWARDS

LEADING EXPERT TO GIVE TALK ON CLIMATE CHANGE IN TRURO

The Diocese of Truro has invited International Climate Change expert Professor Mike Hulme, Professor of Human Geography at the University of Cambridge, to Cornwall in March.

Mike is currently one of the leading voices on Climate Change. With that and plastic free initiatives so prominent in the media, Mike will be giving a lecture entitled 'What's Virtue Got To Do With It?' to a gathering of clergy and local activists.

Mike's work explores the representations of climate change in history, culture and media. He is a published author and was the founder of the Tyndall Centre for Climate Change Research as well as serving on the United Nations Inter-governmental Panel on Climate Change for six years.

The event on March 9 will also give clergy an opportunity to hear from local parishes who have undertaken environmental projects, some of which have been award winning.

SAFEGUARDING, FINANCE & ADMIN OPPORTUNITIES

There are currently three new, part-time opportunities for people to come and work at Church House for the Truro Diocesan Board of Finance.

When Financial Controller Nick Smith announced he was leaving to relocate to Devon, our Director of Finance and Assets Sophie Eddy decided it was a good opportunity to slightly reshape the team. So instead of replacing Nick 'like for like', Sophie decided to break down the roles needed in the finance team.

Instead of a full-time Financial Controller, then, there will be a part-time Finance Manager - who will look after the management accounts, do the forecasting and assist the Director of Finance and Assets with year-end accounts, among other things - and a part-time Finance Assistant. The role of Finance Assistant will incorporate

processing invoices and other administrative tasks within the finance team. Both roles are for 21 hours per week. The new team members will work alongside Finance Officer Agatha Hodges and Sophie.

The third role has been created, on the advice of the Bishop's Diocesan Council, and is that of Diocesan Safeguarding Governance Manager. The need for this 18-hour-per-week role has been established as a result of the SCIE Review, as well as the diocese's own analysis of what needs to be improved and strengthened.

A fixed term position of Executive Assistant is also available supporting Archdeacon Audrey while she covers the Archdeaconry of Cornwall.

MISSION

A LOAD OF JUNK FOOD & AN ABUNDANCE OF LOVE

How many of us shake our heads in horror when we hear how much food is thrown away?

How many more of us worry about food poverty and the growing need and use of Foodbanks?

Camborne and Redruth are currently averaging 10,000 meals a month....

And how many of us put those thoughts into action?

Café Abundance is an enterprise that very much puts those thoughts into action. Part of the Junk Food Project, Café Abundance is the baby of Jemma Morgan and is being loved and nurtured by the communities in Torpoint, Rame and Liskeard.

Jemma, wife of Revd Steve Morgan who became the vicar of Liskeard in May last year, used to run her own bakery when the family lived in Wiltshire, producing artisan bread and patisseries.

Making the move to Cornwall, Jemma wasn't sure what God had in mind for her until she watched a programme on TV with Hugh Fearnley-Whittingstall berating the landfill created by our mass use of unrecyclable-but-allegedly-disposable coffee cups. Her temperature rose and she trawled the internet determined to do something and came across the Real Junk Food Project. A spark was lit and Jemma knew at once what God had in mind.

The Real Junk Food Project intercepts food before it's thrown into rubbish bins



and it is used in Pay-as-you-Feel cafes across the world, with the Abundance Cafe being one of them.

The idea of a 'junk-food café' could conjure up all sorts of images, perhaps slightly grey ones, home-spun and probably not all that tasty. But walking into the Café Abundance in Liskeard, the scene was anything but grey and the food was extremely tasty.

'Jesus at the Ritz'

Staffed by volunteers, the café had a great vibe, busy, colourful and smelt heavenly. Everyone worked hard as orders were taken, cooked and served and the school hall was buzzing with the sounds of people chatting, laughing and enjoying themselves. It felt like a real café with customers most definitely the priority.

"I ask the volunteers to imagine they are serving Jesus at the Ritz!" says Jemma.

SHARE DISCIPLESHIP WITH 'HUBS'

“ Eighteen months ago, Bishop Tim shared with the Bishop's Diocesan Council his predictions for the diocese in the year 2031. This was before any of us realised we would soon be looking for a new episcopal leader! ”

His predictions included a striking idea that 15 years into the future, the diocese would have 200 'cells' or 'hubs' of people meeting together regularly as communities for discipleship. These cells or hubs, said Bishop Tim, would meet weekly to share bread, to pray, to grow as disciples and to explore how to live as Christians within their particular context.

It has been so encouraging to have the Lent course '*Responding to God's Grace*' used across the diocese. To have so many people, in so many different places, exploring the same ideas at the same time feels very powerful. We are all called to experience God's grace, and to live differently as a result of such experience.

Exploring the themes of God's abundance, worship, witness, one body and hope has followed on from the autumn roadshows last year. The Lent material has enabled us all to continue to discover what this means for our own lives, and to explore these ideas more fully, personally and creatively.

We have prayed and we have sung, we have listened to scripture and we have

listened to each other, we have asked questions and we have shared our stories. There may not be 200 Lent groups meeting – but it seems like this has been a move towards Bishop Tim's prediction coming about.

Inspired by Bishop Tim's prediction, the idea of discipleship HUBS has been developed, and resources drawn together for use in parishes. H.U.B.S. stands for Hospitality, Understanding, Belovedness and Sharing – key elements for any group of Christians seeking to learn, live and grow together.

Can your parish establish one or more HUBS so that we can work towards Bishop Tim's prediction coming about, and continue to discover God's kingdom and grow the church here in Truro diocese?

ISLES OF SCILLY HOLIDAY CHAPLAINS SCHEME

During the summer, the Parish of the Isles of Scilly organises worship at each of its churches every Sunday. On St Martin's and on Tresco/Bryher, the services are usually led by a holiday chaplain, who stays at one of our parsonages on each off-island. There are still vacancies for this summer.

The parish asks for a very reasonable letting fee, much below the going rate for Scilly. The only commitment is to lead a eucharistic service or services on Sunday

morning – all occasional offices, parish meetings, emergencies and pastoral work are covered by the Chaplain to the Isles and members of the resident team of clergy and lay people. The letting week goes from Wednesday to Wednesday.

REFILL CORNWALL: JOIN IN TO HELP REDUCE THE PLASTIC IN OUR SEAS

ReFill Cornwall is an exciting community-focussed practical scheme which aims to keep some of the world's most beautiful beaches plastic-free.

The scheme is asking people to make a simple change, and choose tap water, instead of buying bottled water, both at home, and out and about.

Adults in Cornwall will use an estimated 64 million single use plastic water bottles this year.

With low local recycling rates, and a growing demand from industry to make bottles out of single use plastic, the scale of plastic entering our waste streams is rapidly increasing and too much of this waste is littering our oceans and land. Escaped plastic harms wildlife through entrapment and once ingested it finds its way into our food chain.

A ReFill app has now been developed, which allows you to find your local ReFill



station, but add your favourite cafe or pub to the list, and earn rewards while refilling.

Businesses which are involved will have a sticker in their windows, informing passers-by that they are welcome to refill their own flasks and water bottles with free tap water.

JOIN THE LENT PLASTIC CHALLENGE & GIVE IT UP FOR GOOD!

The Church of England has created a calendar with tips for how they can cut plastic out of our lives on each day of the festival.

The Lent Plastic Challenge includes suggestions such as giving up disposable cups, shopping more at local markets, using a bamboo toothbrush, and choosing natural fibres instead of synthetics.

Ruth Knight, the church's environmental policy officer, said: "The Lent challenge is about raising our awareness of how much we rely on single-use plastics and challenging ourselves to see where we can reduce that use. It ties in closely with our calling as Christians to care for God's creation."

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SUPPORT FAIRER FUNDING

Cornwall Council Leader, Adam Paynter is calling on the Government to establish a fairer funding formula and is asking residents and businesses for their support.

Adam says: "At first glance local authorities around the country are all the same. We provide the same public services. We're all experiencing a rise in population and increased demand and pressure on the services we provide.

"But, if you live in Camden then on average the local authority can afford to spend £1,171 per resident, compared to just £784 per head in Cornwall. This is not based on need – it's a lottery based on your postcode, and an outdated funding formula.

"There has never been a better moment for the people of Cornwall to make their

voices heard and help us influence central government by signing our pledge of support [here](#).

"Our older population is increasing more quickly than in other parts of the country. Between 2016 and 2040 Cornwall's population of over 85s will increase by 31% more than in the rest of the UK which will have a significant impact on our services and the costs of providing them.

"A fairer funding model could deliver an extra £39 million for Cornwall every year – that's an extra £71 for every resident. CHURCH IN ACTION REPORT HIGHLIGHTS SOCIAL AND COMMUNITY ACTION

The 2017 Church in Action Report, conducted by Church Urban Fund and the Church of England, has just been released. Based on a survey of more than 1,000 church leaders, it shows that Anglican churches are highly engaged in responding to social issues and building community.

It was found that 70% of Anglican churches run three or more organised activities for the benefit of their local communities, such as parent/carer and toddler groups, community cafes, lunch clubs for older people, holiday clubs and youth work. In addition, the survey highlights the huge amount of the informal help and signposting that churches provide, including for people with mental health problems, family breakdown, and loneliness.

UK POVERTY REPORT 2017 FROM THE JOSEPH ROWNTREE FOUNDATION

In December, the Joseph Rowntree Foundation published 'UK Poverty 2017' a report which examines poverty rates in the UK, and looks at how figures have changed over the past two decades.

The analysis highlights that the three factors which have led to a fall in poverty and are now under question; state support for many of those on low incomes is falling in real terms, rents are increasing, and rising employment is no longer reducing poverty.
