SURVIVORS URGED TO TAKE PART IN TRUTH PROJECT NEXT MONTH

Bishop Chris has urged people who are survivors of childhood sexual abuse to consider contributing to the ongoing national inquiry chaired by Professor Alexis Jay.

The Truth Project is a part of the Independent Inquiry into Child Sexual Abuse and is coming to Cornwall during November 2018. The project is currently arranging these opportunities in Cornwall, and making contact with them now will ensure you can be involved.

Victims and survivors of child sexual abuse will have the opportunity to share their experiences of how institutions, including the Church of England, failed to protect them.

“Voices of survivors need to be heard”

Bishop Chris said: “Many people who suffer abuse during their childhood will feel the effects throughout their lives. As a society and as a church I think we have got better at recognising that, but there is still a long way to go. Key to this is the realisation that we need to hear the voices of survivors; we need to hear from them about the impact that abuse had on them.

“For some individuals that impact can be devastating, and I don’t think we can underestimate the importance of hearing this - not least because it might prompt those who have not experienced abuse to realise that



these are ordinary people - just like anybody else, just like me, just like you.

“I hope these voices will be translated into everyday action to ensure that people of all ages are safe and well looked after, and when we believe that is not the case to give us the courage to speak up and if necessary speak out.

“If you are a survivor of abuse and you were not protected by an institution, I would urge you to consider whether this is something you could contribute to.”

WW1 SCULPTURE CREATED BY VETERANS IN PAUL

Remember the story of former commando Patrick McWilliam and the stone sculpture project for the award-winning Peace Garden at St Pol de Leon?

The plan was to gather a group of ex-servicemen and women affected by post-traumatic-stress disorder to create a sculpture to commemorate the end of WWI. That plan has paid off in ways that even Patrick’s enthusiasm hadn’t anticipated.

The art work is profound. Strong, solid in shape and structure, but also heart-breakingly fragile.

It’s formed of three stone pillars, leaning into each other. On one is the three-hands grasping each other, on another a Tommy helmet and on the third, the words Peace and Pax. The flag draped over the wave etched plinth is separate, set apart but leading you in to what follows.

THE DAC - A FRIEND NOT A FOE

Managing a diocese inevitably involves jargon and a bewildering array of abbreviations, DAC, BDC, OFS, CMS, TMS to name a few. All of which can be intimidating and excluding. And that’s a shame as the people behind the letters work hard to help, encourage and grow the Anglican Church across Cornwall.

Sue Thorold is one such person and she is key to the DAC, or Diocesan Advisory Committee. This represents a wide group of people who invest their time, predominantly voluntarily, and expertise to ensure that all open church buildings across Cornwall are protected, cared for and get a say in what happens to them.

But times move on, the fabric of these precious buildings decay and change become necessary to reflect the different ways in which churches are used today. Churches are not subject to secular planning permission, but must legally comply to ‘faculty jurisdiction.’ A bit like ecclesiastical planning permission.

“I am there right at the beginning,” says Sue, “and I will last the course, working alongside churches to support them through what can sometimes be an overwhelming process.

“People used to think that the DAC always said no to everything,” says Sue. “But we’ve worked hard to change that perception. It isn’t just one person, the Chancellor, who has a say in whether things get approved. He has the last word but he will take advice from other bodies, like the Victorian Society or Historic England.

“We’ve come to know what will be acceptable and what might need re-thinking. So, rather than standing back and letting an application get to the decision stage if we think it will be rejected, we spend a lot of time working with people, including the various bodies, to try to come up with a solution that works for everyone.”

SHARE THE GOOD NEWS -
SWITCH TO RENEWABLES

"Many have been upset by the report from the IPCC (see story right), which told us in no uncertain terms about the urgency of cutting atmospheric carbon. My LinkedIn file was viewed 47 times before 9am that morning and the free 10 Pledges website crashed", writes *Luci Isaacson, Diocesan Environment Officer*.

"But action is underway, and we can be proud that the church is at the forefront. The best action I have seen in three decades of environmental campaigning, was this year at General Synod.

"As DEO, my focus is on empowering those I meet throughout the church to embark on activities that meet the five marks of mission in a whole range of ways. For example, switching to renewable energy is missional because:

- it can visibly bring the power of God to the people of God;
- it helps build a fairer, healthier and more participatory world;

- doing so contributes to a more just, sustainable and peaceful society;

- it transforms a short-term way of life into a longer-term possibility;

- it recognises the natural wealth of Cornwall and turns it into power for the people.

"For individuals doing this, it fulfils Pledge 2; for church buildings it completes Green Church Award Resources Categories 2 and 5.

"Today it can even be cheaper to switch to renewable energy, as discovered by a congregation member at St Constantine who was delighted to see his energy bills go down on switching!

"As Christians, we are the people of Good News. If you have already switched, either individually or as a church, you are in a good position to explain to others that Renewable Energy is Good News for us, Good News for humanity and Good News for God's creation."

BISHOP CALLS FOR UK
'NET-ZERO' COMMITMENT

The Church of England's lead bishop on the environment has said a report published by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) reveals a 'critical risk-level' for global communities.

Speaking from the European Churches Environmental Network in Katowice, Bishop Nicholas Holtam, Bishop of Salisbury, urged the UK Government to commit to a target of net zero emissions by 2050.

"The evidence published by the IPCC shows that the risk level of climate change is now critical. Ours is the first generation to know and understand this and probably the last to be able to do something meaningful towards climate justice," he said.

"The Church of England is playing its part with around 2,000 churches now running on green energy tariffs, and as a voice in the ear of companies in the seven highest emitting sectors through its investment portfolio, leading shareholder resolutions to expedite transition to a low carbon future."



IT'S OK NOT TO BE OK

POPPY MAKERS WANTED



On Sunday, November 11 Truro Cathedral will mark the centenary of the end of World War One with a special 'poppy drop' during the Remembrance Service on Armistice Day. This echoes the 'poppy drop' that took place in November 2014 marking the centenary of the start of World War One.

But before that can happen thousands of paper poppies (each one remembering lives lost during the war) need to be made, so a plea is going out from Truro Cathedral to individuals and community groups to make as many poppies as they can for the drop on Remembrance Sunday.

Information and templates are available the cathedral itself (just inside the west doors on the left) while digital versions are available to download from the 'Get Involved' section of the cathedral website: www.trurocathedral.org.uk. Together with the information display there is a poppy collection point for people to deposit their finished poppies, or people can send them to Truro Cathedral 'A Message For Peace', Old Cathedral School, Cathedral Close, Truro, TR1 2FQ by November 2.
