We also have additional plans and projects brewing to enhance the church's role as a welcoming space for both the congregation and visitors. We are exploring the idea of adding new lighting, better heating, and even a new multifunctional area. This space could provide a warm, inviting setting for coffee mornings, a visitor information area, and refreshments during events.

Tourism plays a big role in the life of Veryan, with many people visiting the church every summer. We aim to make sure everyone feels welcome, regardless of their beliefs, and part of that effort includes translating our church guidebook into German, reflecting our large number of German visitors. Additionally, we are working on an informational display to highlight the Hera model gifted to the church in late 2024 by Kevin Patience. This display will add further interest and context for both visitors and locals.

Longer term, we also hope to add a toilet with disabled access. This improvement is vital in ensuring that the church is accessible to our visitors.

Of course, all these projects come at a cost. Much of our fundraising currently goes towards paying the Ministry and Mission Fund (MMF). This central fund is crucial as it ensures we receive support and training from the Diocese of Truro and contributes towards clergy salaries and resources. However, it does mean that fundraising for specific projects can be challenging.

To bring our plans to life, we will be seeking grants and exploring match funding opportunities. This is a big task, but we believe that expanding the church's offerings is key to securing its future. By improving our facilities and providing a warm, welcoming space, we hope to meet the needs of the congregation and wider community, while also enriching the experience for the many visitors who frequent the church.

With determination and a commitment to work together, we look forward to making these aspirations a reality in the months ahead. We would love to hear your thoughts and suggestions! Thank you for your ongoing support for the church and the important work we do.

Dear brothers and sisters

No change & All change

On 1st February our Pastoral Reorganisation Scheme comes into operation. What does this mean? In many ways it means very little change; the six parishes with their Parochial Church Councils remain as they have been, each with control of their own finances. Jesus' command to love God with our whole being and our neighbour as ourselves still applies, as does his commission to go and make disciples of all people – a challenge that is ever more pressing in today's world. There are no plans to change the pattern of services.

So, what does it mean? On the surface we are all now part of one benefice – one grouping of parishes with the expectation that we will find ways of cooperating for the sake of God's Kingdom. Quite how we work that out is up to us, and that brings us to relationships, which are always at the heart of Christianity. It's been quite a journey that has brought us to this point, one that I only joined towards the end. While some people have felt frustrated at how slow the process has been, others have felt wounded by it all. The Scheme gives us the opportunity to mark a new chapter in the life of our churches.

My title has also changed. I am now Team Rector for all of the parishes. This clears up some ambiguity about my role and means that every Anglican church on the Roseland has a lead minister – me. Of course, ministry has always been shared, and I will continue to work with the many gifted people in our communities.

There will be some changes to the things I do but at the heart of my work there are two priorities: to see our existing churches flourish and to see new growth. There will be challenges but, as we work together, I am sure we will be surprised at the new life that we discover from God.

Meanwhile, please can I ask you to make a note of the weekend of 3rd to 5th May. I'm working with a small team to plan a couple of days of events for us to mark this new chapter of the history of the Church on the Roseland. Bishop Hugh will be joining us for a special service at 4.30pm on the Sunday. I look forward to sharing that time, and all that God will be doing in the future, with you.

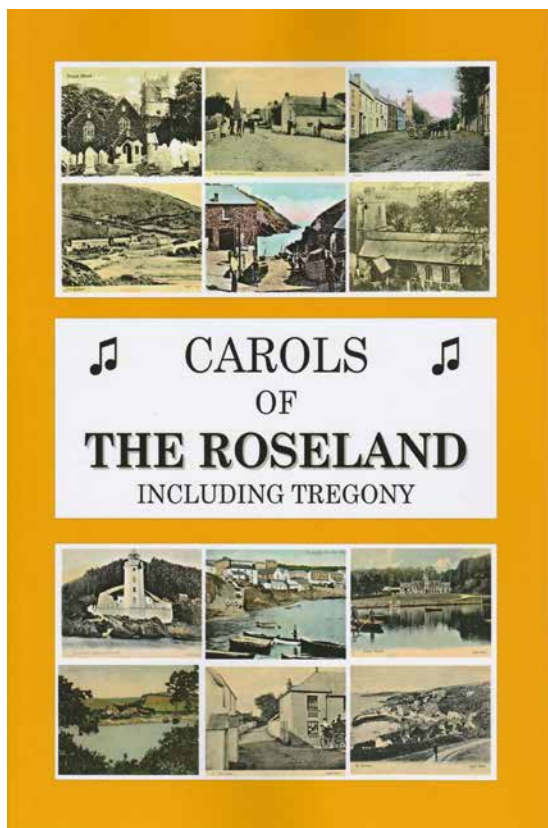
The Future of the Roseland Magazine

Truro Cathedral hosted a festive celebration of carols from the Roseland area in December, bringing together a variety of performers to celebrate the traditions of Cornish Christmas music. Performers included Amici Voci, the Roseland Churches Choir, the newly formed Roseland Carol Choirs, and the community band St. Anthony's Noyse, led by Emma Campbell.

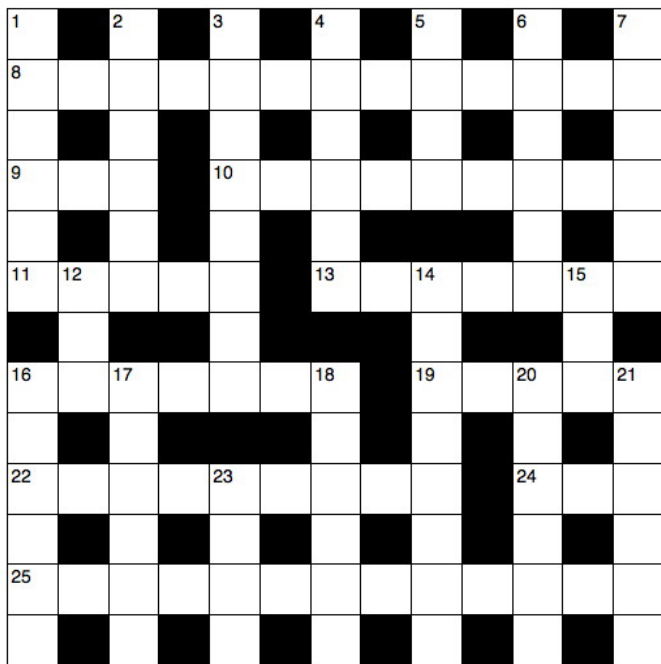
A children's group also participated in the event, performing a newly commissioned carol by Gareth Churcher, head of the Cornwall Music Service Trust.

The event was organized by Nev Meek, President of the Federation of Old Cornwall Societies, who expressed his delight in seeing choirs and community groups come together to revive these carols. Local residents Christine Edwards and Trounce Guy shared their personal memories of carol singing on the Roseland, bringing a sense of history and connection to the proceedings.

A new carol book has been released as part of the efforts to preserve these musical traditions. The collection features 35 carols familiar to the Roseland area, accompanied by their music and harmonies, as well as commentaries by Dr. Neale on their origins and distribution. 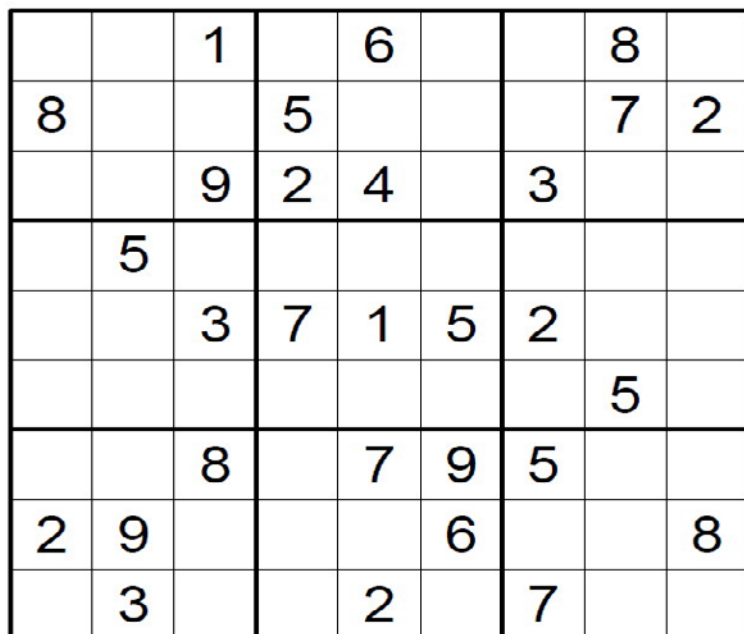

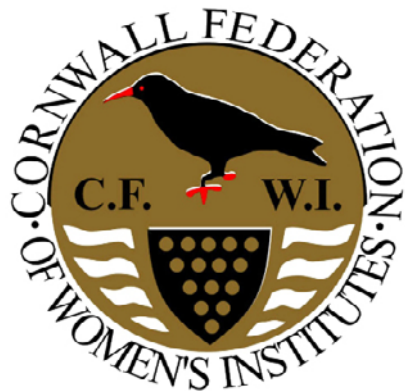

Everyone agreed that the Christmas meal at the Kings Arms, Tregony was excellent.

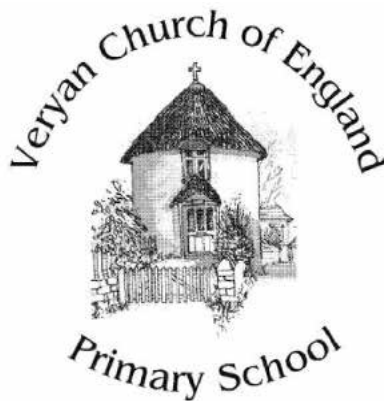

Holy Days for this month

Let's take a look at some significant days and why they are special

11TH FEBRUARY – CAEDMON – THE POETIC SHEPHERD

Caedmon (d 680) should be the patron saint of all farmers who enjoy humming to themselves as they do the lambing this Spring. For Caedmon of Whitby was a bit like David in the Bible; he grew up as a simple herdsman out on the hills who enjoyed composing songs and poetry for himself while watching his flocks.

Like David, Caedmon also had a keen awareness of God, and used his creative gift to express his devotion and love for his Creator. When his poems and songs became known to others, they liked them so much that soon Caedmon left his sheep in order to become a monk. This gave him time to compose many poems based on the stories in the Bible: from Creation and Genesis, to the Exodus and entry of the Jews into the promised land, to the birth, passion and resurrection of Christ, and finally to the future Last Judgement, Heaven, and Hell.

Then one day Caedmon suddenly announced that he knew he was going to die soon. And so he did, in a state of charity and peace with everyone. There was great mourning.

Sadly, only nine lines of his poetry have survived, and we have the great historian, Bede, to thank for even that much. But in his time, Caedmon's gift of telling Christian stories in the vernacular must have been of great value in evangelising the common folk.

14TH FEBRUARY – CYRIL AND METHODIUS, HELPING THE SLAVS

Cyril and Methodius are saints for anyone with good secular qualifications, who now suspects that God may be calling them to use those skills in His service.

Cyril and Methodius were brothers, born into a wealthy family in Thessalonica, in 826 and 815 respectively. Their upbringing destined them for lives of respect and influence.

Methodius, the elder brother, was appointed governor in a Slav province of the Roman Empire, although within a few years he became a monk on Mount Olympus in Asia Minor. Meanwhile his younger brother, Cyril, went into academia in Constantinople, becoming a lecturer in philosophy and librarian.

But then, in 863, the ruler of Moravia, Rostislav, asked the emperor to send him some Christian teachers who could conduct services and teach his people in the Slavonic tongue. Emperor Michael III chose Cyril and Methodius.

It was a daunting task, for the Slavonic language had not yet been written down. But nonetheless, the brothers methodically set about their great work.

Cyril used his academic ability to create an alphabet for the Moravians, which eventually became the Cyrillic alphabet. The brothers then used this written language to teach Christianity in Slavonic, and to provide a way for the Moravians to worship in their own language. The brothers translated much of the liturgy and the gospels to this form.

During their time in Moravia, the brothers faced opposition from missionaries of the German Church, who believed that the official languages of the church should only be Hebrew, Greek or Latin. But the Pope pronounced that both brothers were orthodox, and made them both bishops, with Methodius ending up as Archbishop of Rastislav and Svatopluk.

Cyril and Methodius have been held in high honour, as men who pioneered the use of the vernacular language in church services. Cyril would have been astonished if he had known the eventual consequences of his hard work. For not only did the Slavonic language spread quickly, with him becoming known as the Father of Slavonic Literature, but Slavonic went on to become the language of the Liturgy in the 9th century Russian Church.

Look back, and remember He was with you. Stand still, and realise He is with you. Walk forward, and trust: He will be with you always. . – *Margaret Silf*

15TH FEBRUARY – THOMAS BRAY
– FOUNDER OF SPCK

Thomas Bray was once called a 'Great Small Man', with good reason. This diminutive 18th century English clergyman (1658 – 1730) not only helped to establish the Church of England in Maryland, but he was also founder of the Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge (SPCK) in 1698 and the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts (USPG) in 1701.

Those are long names for societies whose aim was to get Christian books and resources into the hands of those who desperately needed them. For the early 18th century was not an easy time for poor clergymen: books were expensive, and many of them had few, or none to guide them in their ministry. And so, Thomas Bray, who had been educated at Oxford, joined with some other clergy friends to help them.

After a trip to assess the needs of the young Episcopal Church in Maryland (he was sent by the Bishop of London), Bray became rector of St Botolph's, Aldgate in London in 1708. From here he served his parish, and through SPCK eventually established 80 parish libraries in England and a further 39 in the Colonies. SPCK and USPG worked by asking learned authors to donate copies of their books. They also appealed to merchants to the foreign plantations for financial help in establishing the libraries.

Thomas Bray's life has affected hundreds of thousands of people over three centuries. Not only was his work in America the first major coordinated effort to establish libraries in the New World, but SPCK is still one of our leading UK Christian publishing houses today.

As if that was not enough, Bray also worked to help poor debtors emigrate to better lives, and homeless children to get care in England. He helped feed prisoners at Newgate prison in London and joined in the political fight against slavery. He also supported outreaches to Africans and Native Americans in their home countries. When he died on 15th February 1730, thousands mourned him. A great small man indeed!

27TH FEBRUARY – GEORGE HERBERT
– VICAR AND POET

On this day the Church Calendar celebrates George Herbert. For those who are muttering 'never heard of him', just think of the hymn 'Let all the world/ In every corner sing', which he wrote, along with several other hymns which are still popular, even if they are well over 300 years old. In the course of his short life he was a graduate of Cambridge University, a favoured politician of King James, a distinguished poet of the so-called 'metaphysical' school, and a much-loved parish priest at Bemerton, in Wiltshire.

He was born in Wales but grew up in a wealthy family in England. As a student he felt called to ordination, but when he had graduated, he was drawn instead into the government of the time. As a protégé of King James (yes, the one of the 'King James Bible') he could have pursued a career in government, but that youthful call persisted and after a while he turned instead to the ministry of the Church of England. It was an era when many clergy were absentee incumbents, paying someone else to do the parish work while they lived elsewhere, but Herbert set himself to be a true parish priest, noted for his pastoral care and practical support of his parishioners. The whole of his ministry was fulfilled in that one parish, until he died at 39 from what we would now call tuberculosis.

It is of course his hymns for which he is chiefly remembered today, though his Collected Poems are also regarded as jewels of English poetry.
