Six weeks of Summer - Six weeks of fundraising!

We are very pleased to share some exciting news with you: our church has recently been selected as one of only 52 churches nationwide to receive funding through the Church of England's Give to Go Green scheme. This grant marks an important milestone for us, offering an opportunity to make meaningful and long-overdue improvements to the church building - improvements that will enhance our worship, our outreach, and our ability to serve the community.

The Give to Go Green scheme is part of a wider initiative by the Church of England to support parishes in becoming more environmentally sustainable. *(continued on pg2)*

In our case, the focus will be on upgrading the church's heating system. As many of you know, we currently rely on under-pew heaters, which, although appreciated, do not provide adequate warmth throughout the building. Visitors and regular attendees alike often comment on how cold it is, particularly during the colder months. A warmer, more energy-efficient church will be more comfortable, more welcoming, and far more usable throughout the year, not just for Sunday services, but for community events, and gatherings of all kinds.

We are also beginning to explore other improvements, including a much-needed update to the lighting system. We are in the process of applying for grants for this - watch this space!

In order to unlock the full benefit of the Give to Go Green grant, we have been set a clear challenge: **we must raise as much money as possible within a six-week fundraising window** - and every pound we raise during that time will be matched. This is a rare opportunity to double the value of every donation, and we are determined to make the most of it.

To that end, the PCC has worked hard to put together a full calendar of events this summer, designed not only to raise funds, but also to bring people together and celebrate all that our church and village have to offer.

Summer Events Programme

We begin on **Saturday 19th July**, will see the return of our **Church Summer Fête**, from 2.00pm to 5.00pm. This year's fête promises to be bigger and better than ever, with live entertainment from The Devil's HatBand, performances by magician and balloon artist EmazeDad, and a host of stalls and activities. The Women's Institute will once again be serving tea, coffee, and cream teas, and there will be plenty to browse, from bric-a-brac and preloved clothing to books and local produce.

Games and attractions will include hook-a-duck, splat-the-rat, a human fruit machine, Plinko, and an "adopt-a-teddy" stall - plus more surprises on the day.

On Friday 25th July we have a family favourite: the **Teddy Bear Zip Wire**. Children are invited to bring their teddies to the church, where they will be fitted with safety harnesses and hard hats before taking a thrilling zip wire ride from the church tower. Will also attempt to create a "coin mile"! So bring your 2p coins! There will also be a BBQ and light refreshments.

Throughout the summer, we are also hosting a wide range of community activities, including:

A Message from Your Churchwarden

Some of you will already know that in April I suffered a herniated disc in my lower back. It's been quite a journey, and I want to take a moment to say thank you. I've had many messages of support, and the advice shared, and the personal stories you've told me have really helped

I've had an MRI and will soon be seeing a neurologist to plan the next steps, likely surgery. I was understandably nervous at first, but after hearing from so many of you who have had similar experiences, I feel reassured. It's amazing how many people quietly live with back issues, and your openness has really helped me feel less alone.

In the spirit of sharing, I thought I would pass along a few gentle exercises that may help others struggling with lower back pain. (Always consult your doctor first, of course!)

Three Simple Exercises:

Pelvic Tilt – Lie on your back with knees bent and feet flat on the floor. Gently flatten your lower back against the floor by tightening your stomach muscles. Hold for 5 seconds. Repeat 10 times.

Knee-to-Chest Stretch – While lying on your back, bring one knee toward your chest, keeping the other foot on the floor. Hold for 15–30 seconds. Switch sides. Repeat 2–3 times each leg.

Cat-Cow Stretch – On hands and knees, alternate between arching your back up (like a cat) and dipping it down (like a cow). Move slowly and gently. Repeat 10 times.

And above all, don't suffer in silence. If something doesn't feel right, speak up and get it checked. You are not alone, and there is help available.

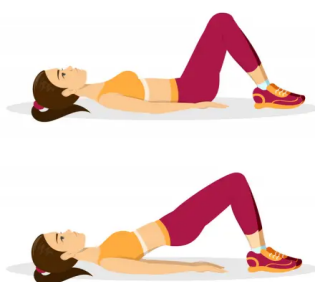

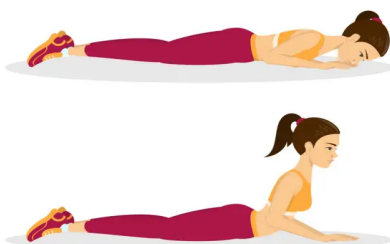

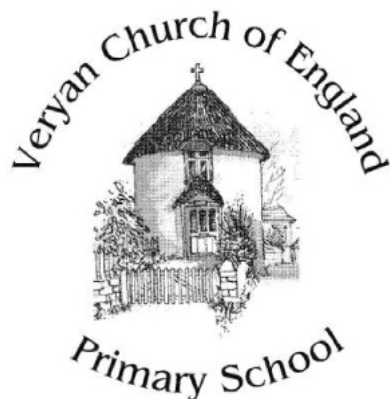

VERYAN CE PRIMARY SCHOOL

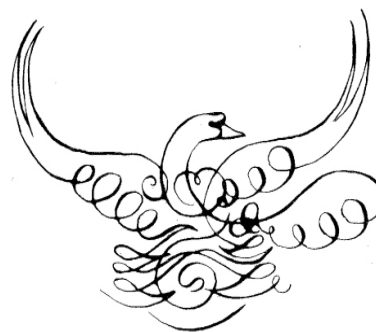
There is lots going on in the school this month as we head towards the busiest and final term of the year.

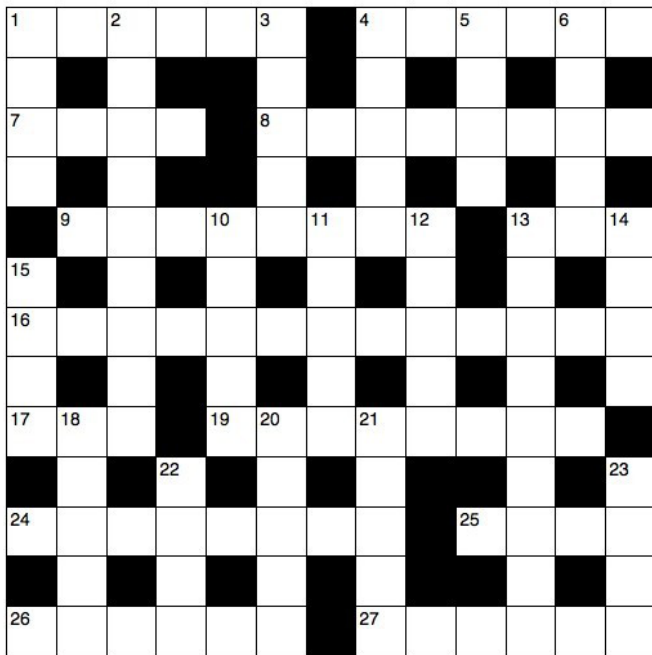
VERYAN CHURCH PCC

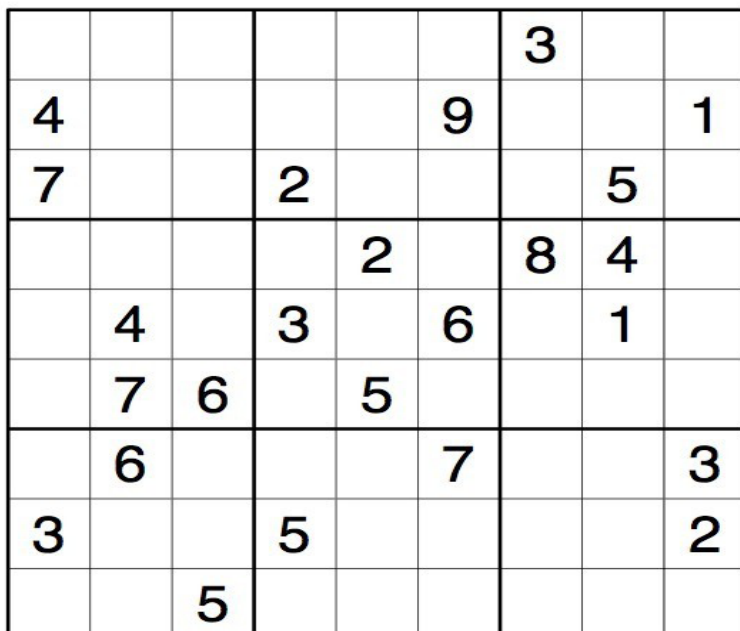

Holy Days for this month

Let's take a look at some significant days and why they are special

4TH JUNE – ST PETROC

... THE FOUNDER OF PADSTOW

If you would like to be in Cornwall this summer in search of peace and quiet, Petroc is the saint for you. Especially if you used to find Padstow a bit too crowded for your liking! He would have sympathised.

This 6th century abbot is Cornwall's most famous saint. Petroc set sail from South Wales, landed at Haylemouth, and founded a monastery at Lanwethinoc – now called Padstow, after him (Petroc's Stow).

Padstow must have been popular even in those days, because about 30 years later Petroc, in search of some peace and quiet, moved on to build another monastery at Little Petherick (Nanceventon). Here he must have decided to try some 6th century equivalent of 'Fresh Expressions', because he engaged with his local community by building a mill and a chapel.

In time, Petroc began feeling crowded again. So he tramped off to the remote wilds of Bodmin Moor, where he lived as a hermit – until some 12 monks turned up to join him. Firmly, Petroc kept them all housed in a monastery on a hilltop, while he enjoyed his private space in a cell by the river.

But even here Petroc was not alone. One day a terrified stag came rushing through the woods, pursued by the hunt. Petroc flung open the door of his cell, and the panting animal took refuge. When the huntsmen arrived on the scene, they did not dare to argue with the famous holy man, and went their way. The stag's gratitude made him tame, and Petroc would come to be portrayed with a stag as his special emblem.

Petroc was buried in the monastery in Padstow but in c.1000 his shrine and relics, including his staff and bell, were translated to Bodmin. Here they have stayed ever since, except for a short, unplanned trip to Brittany in 1177, when they were stolen and carted off by a naughty Canon of the Church. Henry II intervened, and everything but a rib of Petroc was eventually returned.

6TH JUNE – ST GUDWAL

... THE FIRST CHRISTIAN IN BRITTANY?

If you would love to be in Brittany for your holiday this summer, then spare a thought for Gudwal, because this obscure 6th century Celtic abbot got there before you did. Indeed, Gudwal seems to have liked Brittany so much that he decided to stay on.

When you visit Brittany today, you will find Catholic churches everywhere. Not so in the sixth century – when only the extraordinary range of megalithic monuments dominated the landscape. There were (and still are) passage dolmens, stepped pyramids and stone circles. The best known site is Carnac, where remains of a dozen rows of huge standing stones run for over ten kilometres. Some of the megalithic ruins in the gulf of Morbihan date back to at least 3300 BC – that is 200 years older than Stonehenge.

Religion was certainly plentiful in Brittany, back then. But Gudwal was one of the earliest pioneers of Christianity in the region. He did a bit of 6th century 'church planting', too – when he decided to build a hermitage in the middle of all that paganism – probably at Locoal. In time, 188 monks came to join him, and they built a little monastery – probably at Guer.

But it was the man himself – his holiness and kindness – that drew people's attention more than the buildings. A man of deep spirituality and prayer, Gudwal willingly spent himself on helping the local people – it was said that he healed many by his prayers for them.

15TH JUNE – TRINITY SUNDAY
.... CELEBRATING OUR GOD WHO IS THREE PERSONS

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, which gives us life and illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.'

Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.

15TH JUNE – FATHERS' DAY
A TIME TO CELEBRATE MALE ROLE MODELS
